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APH Census

appy New Year from Low Incidence Outreach.
LIO has mailed out the annual American Printing
House for the Blind (APH) Census that identifies
students who meet the definition of blindness.
This census directly affects the funds credited
to Federal Quota accounts, which are maintained and
administered by APH and its Ex Officio Trustee. Please make
sure to register all eligible students.

A new requirement this year is a Parent Consent Form, which gives LIO permission to share each student's information with APH for funding. If LIO does not receive this information, the student will not be counted as eligible to receive quota funds. The consent form needs to be completed only once for existing eligible students. Thank you in advance for taking the time to complete and return the census and consent form.

UEB Literacy Expansion Program



Family Nature Club Snow Adventure

W

ith average winter temperatures in the teens, most of us like to stay inside with a hot cup of coffee, watching a movie or reading a book. Not members of Camp Tuhsmeheta's Family Nature Club!

Instead of staying cozy indoors, a group of 30 courageous outdoor enthusiasts traveled from Camp T to the Muskegon Winter Sports Complex a few weeks ago. The Winter Sports Complex offers a variety of cross country ski and snowshoe trails, ice rinks, sledding hills, and even a luge run! Our goal, however, was to travel by snowshoe in one of the most unique winter landscapes in Western Michigan: the Lake Michigan shoreline.

Snowshoeing in temperatures that reached 40 degrees, we were very excited to visit the shoreline and experience the power and rugged force of Lake Michigan in winter. After meandering through woodlands and scaling dunes, we arrived at the shore. To our surprise, we found none of the mighty waves and thunderous crashes we expected from one of Michigan's great lakes. Instead, the water was frozen for hundreds of yards from the shoreline.

We were awestruck by the quiet of such a vast expanse. Mountains and caverns of ice, along with plateaus of frozen water, separated the sandy dunes from the blue, waveless horizon. The group explored the arctic terrain, climbing the icy hills and sitting in smooth, concave depressions formed by waves. The unique opportunity to climb on Lake Michigan in the winter will be something our group will remember forever.

The Family Nature Club (FNC) is a monthly group where families meet up at Camp Tuhsmeheta and connect around a natural theme. All families and adults who are blind or visually impaired (BVI) are invited to attend. Pages App

This app functions like Microsoft Word in that it allows the user to write down and format their document. Available from Google Play and the iTunes App Store, Pages is a great and accessible word processor to use. One of its most effective features can be found within a given document: You can convert any file into PDF, RTF, DOCX, or EPUB. The following steps outline how to do this:

- Open a document in Pages and tap "more." Several menu options will appear.
- Select the "Send a Copy" option. A screen with the formats mentioned above will appear. Choose the format you want to convert to.
- After choosing a format, another set of choices will appear. These are the ways you can send or share this document.
- Tapping on an option ("Mail," for example) will allow you to enter the address, subject, and message to the recipient. The document will accompany the email as an attachment.

Advanced BrailleNote Touch

Location: Michigan Library and Historical Center, Lansing Date: February 8, 2018

The BrailleNote Touch offers braille-reading students numerous ways to access academic content and express ideas in classroom settings. This advanced workshop will focus on web browsing, accessing books, sharing content to the cloud, and using KeyMath to graph equations. Those attending will participate in a mix of demonstration, discussion, and hands-on activities.

Beginner BrailleNote

This hands-on workshop will instruct participants on the various features of the BrailleNote and how it can be an effective tool in the classroom.

Connect 12 / MATT Connect Introduction

Location: Michigan Library and Historical Center, Lansing Date: February 9, 2018

The Connect 12 / MATT Connect combines a high-performance digital magnifier with the versatility of an Android tablet. In this handson workshop, participants will use features of the devices to view and capture printed materials. They will utilize the distance camera to make observations and annotate on worksheets using writing, typing, and highlighting functions. Participants will also turn on magnification features of Android and explore apps that can be downloaded from the Google Play Store.

Developing an Assistive Technology Assessment For a Student Who is Blind or Visually Impaired (BVI)

Location: Lansing Date: March 21-22, 2018

To succeed in the educational setting, students who are BVI must learn to maximize their use of assistive technology. Therefore, it is important to select assistive technology that matches students' abilities with learning goals, which can be challenging for teachers and administrators. This two-day interactive workshop will explore how to effectively choose the right technology for BVI students in the classroom, home, and community. In addition, participants will learn what the assistive technology assessment process entails.

Teaching Excel 2010 Using JAWS

Location: Genesee Intermediate School District (ISD), Flint Dates: March 15-16, 2018

This course is designed for individuals who will be teaching a student with a visual impairment how to use Microsoft Excel 2010 using JAWS. Participants should be experienced with the basics of Microsoft Excel and using JAWS with Microsoft products.

Tips and Reminders



Orientation and Mobility Tip

his winter's snow and ice has presented safety issues for orientation and mobility (O&M) specialists when walking on slippery or snow-covered sidewalks, driveways, and parking lots. A good traction aid such as ice grippers, ice cleats, or ice spikes may prove to be useful, easy, and inexpensive.

Removable traction devices are meant to slip on and off your shoes and have some sort of flexible harness that stretches to fit over your shoe or boot. They can be made of steel or aluminum spikes, coils, or chains, and are placed on the underside of your footwear.

Keep in mind that devices can differ greatly from each other. A nonslip device that works well on hard-packed snow might not work as well for walking on hard ice. A lower body weight may correlate to reduced traction, so those with a lower weight might want to consider a device with spikes instead of coils.

There is no perfect device, and what might work best for you is unique to your situation. Consider using a nonslip device frequently or only on rare occasions, as some devices last longer than others and prices can vary greatly.
